The California Commission on Aging (CCoA) will share findings and recommendations from Rebuilding Lives: Disaster Response and Recovery for Older Adults and Adults with Disabilities in California. The report draws on testimony from CCoA's May 5 informational hearing, which included experts in aging and disability, medical and government responders to the January 2025 Los Angeles wildfires, and community members who were displaced. The report highlights recurring challenges, barriers to recovery, and how California can better prepare for an aging population likely to face more frequent and increasingly severe natural disasters.

Black Advocacy in Action – *Grand F*

Older Black Californians face persistent barriers to aging with dignity, health, and community. This panel will explore gaps in behavioral health, wellness infrastructure, and caregiving supports, introducing culturally responsive reforms aligned with the Master Plan for Aging to strengthen Black-led organizations, community-based models, and culturally rooted care. Panelists will advance strategies to promote health equity, elevate community-led wellness and behavioral health solutions, and reimagine caregiving ecosystems, particularly for solo agers. The discussion will highlight disparities in mental health and chronic illness, share promising practices, address systemic barriers facing Black caregivers, and foster dialogue among advocates, policymakers, and providers to expand wraparound supports and drive racial equity statewide.

Better Together: An MCO, AAA, and CBO Partnership to Expand Access to Assisted Living – *Grand G*

California's systems serving older Medi-Cal enrollees with functional or behavioral health disabilities and those experiencing homelessness are fragmented, resulting in unmet needs and avoidable institutionalization. Assisted living (AL) can be a viable alternative, yet misconceptions about access – such as the 10,000+ person waitlist for the Assisted Living Waiver – limit its use. This session will explore alternative pathways into AL through county behavioral health funding and CalAIM's Assisted Living Facility Transition Community Support, following a Medi-Cal enrollee's transition journey and identifying partnership opportunities among health plans, care hubs, AL operators, and Area Agencies on Aging. Drawing from key informant interviews led by the Center for Health Care Strategies with support from the California Health Care Foundation, panelists will share insights on strengthening cross-system collaboration to advance the Master Plan for Aging's goals of bridging health care with home and ending homelessness for older adults.

We Can't Give Up: Breaking Barriers to Healthy Living for Older Adults in Rural Communities – *Garden 1*

In rural communities like Campo in San Diego County's Mountain Empire region, older adults face major barriers to health and connection due to limited access to fresh food, safe spaces for activity, and reliable transportation. This session will show how building trust, forming local partnerships, and responding to community needs can create lasting change. What began as a simple nutrition class evolved into a garden club, community garden, and social activities like karaoke and virtual exercise classes – all strategically tied to congregate meal times to boost participation. Attendees will learn practical strategies to engage rural older adults, strengthen partnerships, and design sustainable, community-driven programs that foster health and belonging in underserved areas.

Intergenerational Allies: Building a Multigenerational Culture Through Local Innovation – *Garden 2*

This panel explores how local, intergenerational partnerships can reduce isolation, foster inclusion, and build age-friendly connections in schools. Highlighting Golden Connections – an award-winning, student-led initiative founded by Leena at a Garden Grove high school in partnership with Olive Community Services – the session showcases how monthly "Lunch & Learn Roundtables" bring teens and seniors together on campus to share wisdom and conversation without transportation barriers. Recognized by MIT AgeLab for innovation, the program offers a scalable model for replication statewide. Panelists will discuss how this grassroots effort advances Master Plan for Aging goals around inclusion, caregiving, and age-integrated communities, and share strategies to spark youth engagement and create sustainable, inclusive intergenerational programs across California.

From Pilot to Powerhouse: The Strategy and Success Behind Evolving Models of Digital Inclusion – *Grand F*

What does it take to grow a small pilot into a high-impact, community-driven program? This workshop from Sourcewise (PSA 10) will share how identifying digital equity gaps among low-income, linguistically diverse, and socially isolated older adults in Santa Clara County led to an evolving program that moved from virtual to hybrid to in-person delivery. Featuring outcomes from over 1,200 participants served at seven sites, the session will highlight gains in digital literacy, social connection, and confidence, along with the cross-sector partnerships – spanning Google, Community Tech Network, local senior centers, and city agencies – that fueled sustainability. Participants will leave with a practical three-part framework for designing and scaling community-based pilots grounded in collaboration and measurable impact.

Addressing Rural Aging Disparities in California: Policy Solutions & Collaborative Advocacy – *Grand G*

More than one in ten older Californians live in rural areas where access to healthcare, LTSS, transportation, and broadband is limited – challenges compounded by financial insecurity, racial disparities, and climate risks. Despite these issues, rural aging has been largely absent from statewide policy discussions since 2011. Building on local Master Plan for Aging efforts led by UC Davis and The SCAN Foundation with regional coalitions, this session will present new policy briefs outlining state-level solutions to rural challenges in housing, workforce, and healthcare access. Participants will explore strategies for cross-regional collaboration, identify policy and funding opportunities, and advance equity for older adults and caregivers in rural California.

Hearing the Voices of Older Adults: From Statewide Vision to Local Action in Master Planning and Housing – *Grand F*

Stakeholder engagement is central to the success of California's Master Plan for Aging (MPA), relying on the voices of older adults, people with disabilities, caregivers, and service providers. This session will showcase two engagement models: one focused on direct services that help older adults age in place, and another advancing policy change to expand affordable housing. Featuring insights from LifeSTEPS and LeadingAge California, panelists will explore how centering older adults' voices leads to stronger programs and policies, share practical strategies for co-production and resident engagement, and offer tools to scale these approaches statewide – all while reinforcing the MPA's emphasis on inclusion and collaboration.

Together for Veterans – Garden 1

As California's veteran population ages, many face barriers to accessing earned VA benefits due to isolation, mobility limitations, and lack of awareness – factors that increase financial insecurity, mental health risks, and vulnerability to exploitation. To address this, the Fresno County Veterans Service Office (FCVSO) and the Together for Veterans Coalition created a proactive outreach model that brings accredited Veterans Service Representatives directly to over 200 elder care facilities across the Central Valley. By providing on-site benefit counseling and claims support for programs like Aid & Attendance, DIC, and survivor assistance, this initiative strengthens access, prevents fraud, and supports suicide prevention through trusted, ethical, and community-based service delivery.

Leveraging CalAIM to Strengthen Aging Services: Lessons from the Anthem ECM & Community Supports Pilot – Garden 2

This session examines how California's Aging Network can integrate with Medi-Cal managed care through CalAIM, featuring two regional implementations of the Anthem ECM and Community Supports pilot led by Agency on Aging 4 and Sourcewise (PSA 10). Panelists will share strategies for intake, referrals, data sharing, staffing, and maintaining OAA compliance while expanding services. The California Elder Index: A Tool for Advancing Equity for Older Californians Experiencing Economic Insecurity – *Grand F*

This workshop introduces the California Elder Index (CEI), a data equity tool that measures the true cost of living for older adults across all 58 counties. Unlike the Federal Poverty Level, the CEI accounts for local housing, health care, food, and transportation costs, and integrates demographic data to highlight disparities by gender, race, age, and household type. Participants will learn how to use CEI dashboards and data to inform policy, program planning, and resource allocation that reflect the real economic conditions of older Californians, with hands-on guidance and county-level examples provided.

Los Angeles County Adult Protective Services' (APS) Center of Excellence (COE): An Elder Abuse Forensic Center Model - Grand G

Established in August 2023, the Los Angeles County Elder Abuse Forensic Center – also known as the Center of Excellence – serves as a multidisciplinary hub for addressing elder abuse and protecting vulnerable older adults and individuals with disabilities. This session will overview the center's forensic, legal, and therapeutic services; showcase its collaborative team of experts in social work, medicine, psychology, law enforcement, and advocacy; and share case studies illustrating innovative support for APS social workers. Panelists will also discuss future initiatives to expand the center's reach and serve as a statewide model for elder justice and prevention.

Policy in Practice: Implementing a Values-Based Food Purchasing Framework in San Diego – *Garden 1*

This session will showcase the County of San Diego's Sustainable, Equitable, and Local Food Sourcing Policy, which directs its \$33 million food budget – providing over 8 million meals annually to vulnerable populations – toward sustainability, nutrition, and equity. Aligned with the Older Americans Act and the Older Californians Nutrition Program, the policy promotes whole, minimally processed, and culturally inclusive foods while supporting local economies and the environment. Through case studies and implementation tools, participants will learn how values-based procurement and cross-departmental collaboration strengthen health, equity, and community connection for older adults across the county.

Implemented across California's community colleges, it has delivered measurable gains in enrollment, economic mobility, and intergenerational engagement while aligning with the Master Plan for Aging and workforce priorities. Challenging Times: Serving Older Adults in a Changing Federal and State Landscape – *Grand F*

Bridging State & Local Aging Plans: Lessons from California's Local Aging & Disability Action Planning (LADAP) Grant Program – *Grand G*

California's Master Plan for Aging (MPA) is a 10-year, multisector roadmap to build a state for all ages and abilities. In 2023, the Department of Aging launched the \$4.5 million Local Aging and Disability Action Planning (LADAP) Grant Program, supporting 20 organizations across 30 communities to develop equitable, actionable local plans. Analyzed by UC Davis's Family Caregiving Institute, this session will share findings and lessons from two years of grantee work, highlighting innovative, equity-centered strategies such as multilingual engagement and grassroots partnerships. Participants will learn how local plans advance the MPA's Five Bold Goals through housing, health care access, caregiver support, and inclusion – and explore practical tools for sustaining local momentum.

Wiser Dining for Congregate Meals: The Lunch Buddies Bistro Story – How Changing the environment increased participation at the Benicia center – *Garden 1*

Congregate Meal programs often struggle to attract and retain participants, but Solano County's Lunch Buddies Bistro offers a successful new model. By transforming traditional meals into lively, restaurant-style social experiences, attendance at one site grew from just two diners to over 35 in three months. This session will highlight how thoughtful design, dynamic programming, and cross-sector collaboration can revitalize meal sites, reduce isolation, and improve health outcomes. Participants will learn actionable strategies to enhance engagement, integrate culturally relevant activities, and create welcoming, sustainable dining environments that foster community and connection.

Housing instability is a growing crisis for older adults – especially women and communities of color – who face systemic inequities and rising care needs. This session highlights homesharing as a promising solution, pairing older adults with extra space and those seeking affordable housing to foster stability, mutual support, and intergenerational connection. Drawing on research from Cal State Chico, Cal State Sacramento, UC Berkeley, and multiple California homeshare organizations, panelists will share insights on participant motivations, program benefits and challenges, organizational needs, and policy lessons learned amid social and economic pressures such as funding gaps and wildfires.

Established under Initiative #93 of California's Master Plan for Aging, the Elder Disability Justice Coordinating Council (EDJCC) strengthens statewide coordination to prevent and address elder abuse, neglect, exploitation, and fraud. Modeled after the federal Elder Justice Coordinating Council but with broader multi-sector participation, the EDJCC advances collaborative, cross-system solutions. This session will highlight the Council's structure, 2025–2026 priorities, and opportunities for attendees to engage in efforts to promote safety, justice, and prevention for older adults and people with disabilities.

How to Leverage Technology to Build Meaningful Connections with Caregivers with an Award-Winning Program – *Garden 2*

Developed by PSA 10 in partnership with Stanford during the pandemic, MyPlan is a web-based platform that supports informal caregivers of older adults through personalized resources, assessments, and training tools – now available in English and Spanish. Integrating PHQ-9 and SDOH screenings, MyPlan helps reduce caregiver isolation and stress, with reported decreases of 60% in loneliness, 32% in depression, and 9% in food insecurity. This session will share insights behind MyPlan's development, demonstrate its measurable impact, and highlight how it advances Area Plan goals and CalAIM Community Supports through expanded caregiver engagement and respite services.

Information & Assistance: The Gateway to Services and Supports – *Garden 2*

The California AAA Network utilizes and relies on Information & Assistance (I&A) services to assist older adults and their caregivers in finding services that will support living in the community. To better understand existing I&A infrastructure and key performance indicators, the California Department of Aging and Collaborative Consulting conducted a secondary data landscape analysis of I&A-related activities across the California AAA Network. Results show wide variability across activities, including service training standards, data collection practices, public outreach, service quality, and performance measures. As a result of this analysis, several opportunities were identified to strengthen the consistency and quality of I&A-related services statewide. In this informative session, the key findings of the landscape analysis and their implications will be discussed.
